When and where was Steinbeck born?

7. Who are the two main characters in the book *Of Mice and Men*?

8.	Steinbeck wrote about the poor working class people suffering from the Great Depression. What part of the body did Steinbeck use often to symbolize the working class person?
9.	What is unique about Tom Collin's Labor Camp versus the majority of the other camps?
10.	Who lives in the migrant camps now? Are you surprised that we still have these camps to this day?
11.	What is Steinbeck's opinion on how humanity's relationship with nature?

Respond to this quote with <u>a paragraph</u> of your own: "America has gone soft, a nation, or a group or an individual cannot survive being softthe individual only survives when the pressure is on him. The American people are losing their ability to be versatile, to do things for themselveswhen people or animals loose their versatility, they become extinct" (Steinbeck).
